Housing	Create new housing for young adults who are homeless, including those who are LGBTQIA+ and/or have been in foster care.	Advocate for Office of Homeless Services to prioritize accessible, recovery-focused housing.	Strengthen and expand the Housing Trust Fund (HTF), with half of all money for households earning 30% or less of Area Median Income (AMI), adding \$35M annually from expiring tax abatements, and maintaining required community representation on the oversight board.	Advocate for the Philadelphia Housing Authority to increase supply of Project Based Vouchers (PBV), Rental Assistance Demonstration (RAD), Move On vouchers, and other supports for affordable housing development.	Require that all eligible publicly-held land be transferred into the Land Bank; create a strategy to acquire tax-delinquent property; and dedicate Land Bank land for community benefit such as affordable, accessible housing and community gardens.
Opportunities for Employment and Income	Maintain or expand programs to increase access to public benefits (including the Federal child tax credit for families who do not file tax returns) and educate the public on connection between work and Supplemental Security Income (SSI)/ Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI).	Fund skills training to improve access to living wage jobs.	Expand supports like stipends for unemployed workers in job trainings, childcare for job-seekers and programs for temp and gig workers.	Expand job slots for people with lived experience of recovery, homelessness, mental health conditions, and incarceration, including expanding training and ongoing supports for Certified Peer Specialists.	Evaluate New Normal Jobs Initiative, specifically upskilling Home Health Aides and PowerCorpsPHL on the basis of jobs gained, wages, and retention and publicize outcomes.

Advocate for a city emergency preparedness plan for people experiencing homelessness informed by a debrief on COVID- 19.	Improve practice of integrating behavioral health support in emergency crisis response system which disproportionately harms BIPOC communities by: addressing racial disparities in policing, behavioral health treatment and crisis response; pairing emergency medical with behavioral health support to respond to people in crisis (including 302/involuntary commitment and 911 calls); and increasing the number of mobile behavioral health teams.

Preserve and expand services funding for people in permanent supportive housing (PSH) through innovation because housing is healthcare. Opportunities for Employment and Income	Provide mandatory education to Supplemental Security Income (SSI) recipients and providers about allowable income limits and incentives to increase employment among people receiving SSI.	Expand Apprenticeship System including concurrent vocational certification through the Department of Labor & Industry.	Use tax credit regulations and other tools to incentivize hiring of low-income individuals.	Increase safety net and income supports (General Assistance, universal basic income, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), SSI State Supplemental Payments) as part of a strategy of homelessness prevention and peg to indicator for cost-of-living adjustment. Expand Medicaid reimbursement to teeth preserving procedures (crowns and root canals) to address racial and socioeconomic disparities in dental care, which impacts nutritional health, mental health, and employment. 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Housing	Strengthen Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) program by: increasing LIHTC by 50% and tax credit basis by 50% for Extremely Low Income targeted development; amending the Opportunity Zone section of the tax code to allow for gap-filling in LIHTC developments; and creating a pilot for supportive services in LIHTC deals that would be administered by states to LIHTC allocation agencies.	Increase funding for: federal rental assistance and public housing programs; new operating support/rent subsidies (Project Based Vouchers (PBVs) & Rental Assistance Demonstration (RAD)) to reduce homelessness and move more families out of poverty; and Homeless Assistance Grants.	Prioritize a range of options to meet diverse needs, including accessible housing for people with disabilities and recovery-oriented housing, within Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and within Continuum of Care guidance for states and localities.	Exponentially increase funding for the Housing Trust Fund.
